The richest resource on Social and emotional learning for educators is certainly the <u>Collaborative</u> <u>for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning</u> (CASEL), founded in 1994 to make evidence-based social and emotional learning an integral part of education from preschool through high school.

With respect to democratic practices, the approach called "<u>Transformative SEL</u>" is particularly relevant. It is defined as a form of SEL implementation where young people and adults build strong, respectful, and lasting relationships to engage in co-learning. This approach focuses on:

- Identity
- Agency
- Belonging
- Collaborative Problem-Solving
- Curiosity
